



Kindergarten Transition Process

- Your child will need back-to-school supplies such as a backpack and clothing. Find out
 what your child needs for their school. Look for the list on the school's website. Make
 a plan to get as much of it ready as possible. Many community partners host supply
 give-aways.
- If your family needs help, reach out to the <u>Family Resource Center (FRC) coordinator</u>
 at your school. The FRC can help your family access the JCPS Clothing Assistance
 Program (CAP) which can provide free uniforms and other clothing. They can also help
 with supplies and appointments for health screenings.
- Walk, ride, or drive by your child's school if possible this summer. Point the building
 out to your child and talk about how much they are going to learn at school. This
 helps your child know that school is a safe place where learning happens.







Focus on May

- Ask families if they received their school assignments for kindergarten.
- Encourage families to sign up for their school's social media accounts and watch for information about transition and back-toschool events.




Year Prior to Kindergarten


- Practice answering questions like, "Where do you live?" and "What is your phone number?" Your child needs to know this information if there is an emergency: <u>Knows Personal Information Family Activity</u>.
- Look at books about school. You can talk about how the characters are making friends and learning at school: <u>Plays and Shares with Other Children Family Activity</u>.

Kindergarten Transition Process

- See if your child is eligible for the JCPS Camp Ready4K—a summer camp to help welcome children into kindergarten. Registration typically occurs in early May. This program fills up quickly, so sign up early!
- Watch for information from your school about welcome events during the summer and early fall. Many schools will send mail or email to your family.



COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN Health Requirements





In Kentucky, there are <u>health_requirements</u> for school entry. State law sets these requirements. Children need health screenings. These exams are essential for school staff to support children's medical needs.


Health Screenings	Deadline
Physical Exam	Within two months of starting school
Dental Screening	By January 1 of kindergarten year
Eye Exam	By January 1 of kindergarten year



Children also need up-to-date immunizations. At your child's physical exam, ask your provider if your child has all their shots. Get a new copy of their <u>Kentucky Immunization</u>. <u>Certificate</u>. Families can ask to waive immunizations for medical or <u>religious</u> reasons. If families ask for exemption, they still need a copy of <u>their child's Immunization</u> Certificate. Schools should have your child's paperwork within the first two weeks of school.

Make appointments early in the year. Spring is a great time to schedule with healthcare providers. There are many resources in the community to help with free or low-cost healthcare for your child.

- You can visit <u>Family Health Centers</u> for providers, services, and information in your preferred language.
- The <u>Family Resource Center (FRC)</u> coordinator at your school may be able to help you
 with vouchers for health screenings. You may request interpretation when talking to
 JCPS stdf. The <u>LSpeak cards</u> can help you request an interpreter.
- Louisville Metro Public Health and Wellness gives immunizations for school entry at their Newburg and Dixie clinics. You must set up an appointment by calling 502-574-5380. You can also check your child's records if they received their shots in lefferson County.



COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN Toileting Skills





Toileting can be a tricky topic for families of young children. Each child moves toward independent toilet use at their own pace. Your family can do what works best as you work toward your child's goal of using the toilet on their own. When children transition to kindergarten, teachers and staff are ready to meet children where they are. This includes toileting!

At school, children will attempt to use the restroom on their own. It does not matter if your child is completely toilet trained, there are parts of toileting that they can begin doing on their own. Go through the checklist with your child. Keep practicing the skills that your child cannot do we.

Yes	Independent Toileting Skill
	I can tell a grown-up when I need to use the restroom.
	I can pull my pants down and back up when I use the toilet.
	If I use a urinal, I can lower my pants just enough to use the restroom without exposing my lower body.
	I can use toilet paper to wipe myself.
	I can flush the toilet.
	I can wash my hands.



For Parenting Adults

Considerations as Children Transition to Kindergarten

- Dress your child in clothes that are easy for them to take down and pull back up.
- Share your child's toileting needs with their kindergarten teacher. Teachers can help your child set and meet goals when using the restroom at school.
- · Put extra underwear and sets of clothes in your child's backpack in case of accidents.
- If your child has medical needs related to toileting, talk to your child's healthcare provider or specialist.
 They can complete forms to help schools create a plan to address these needs.

Tips for Toilet Training

- Praise your child when they try to use the toilet, even if they have an accident. When you do this, they
 will not feel anxious about the process.
- Make a plan. Have your child try to use the toilet when they wake up in the morning and after naps, before leaving your home, before naps and bedtime, and before meals.
- Use this <u>resource from ICPS Early Childhood</u> to learn more about toilet training. It includes a chart to track times when your child succeeds in part of toilet training.

JCPS Board Policy

- In school year 2021–2022, JCPS adopted JCBE <u>policy 08.1348</u>: Certified Oral and Written Language Support. This policy identifies District <u>obligations</u> to use <u>certified interpreters and translators</u> for formal communications with JCPS international populations—including families.
- Examples of formal communication include: parent visits to schools, phone calls, meetings, translation of application and enrollment information, etc.






Formal vs. Informal Communication

Formal Communication	Informal Communication
Requires a certified interpreter or translator	Can use bilingual staff or machine translations like Google translate
Formal meetings include special education (IEP) meetings, parent teacher conferences, etc.	A teacher wants to learn a few words of students' home languages so they can greet families
Documents include registration, application, enrollment, school calendars, report cards, school improvement plans, etc.	When a teacher wants to send note home in a student's agenda praising their work

JCPS Language Services

- To comply with JCBE **policy 08.1348**, our District offers different modalities of interpretation and document translation through the Language Services office.
- These services are available to ALL JCPS families, students, and employees.
- Services must be accessed by a JCPS employee.





On-Demand Interpretation


- JCPS contracts with an on-demand interpretation service.
- Interpreters are available by phone or app.
- Families can request an interpreter; however, employees must initiate the use of these services.





I Speak Cards

- JCPS has created <u>I Speak Cards</u> in 21 different languages to aid families in requesting language support.
- The cards also have directions for district staff on how to access ondemand language support by phone.

Transitioning to Kindergarten for Multilingual and International Families

Your child is starting a new journey in formal education. When children go to kindergarten, the transition can be hard for families. Jefferson County Public Schools (JCPS) has <u>resources</u> to help international and multilingual families as they begin kindergarten.

You may ask for an interpreter when talking with JCPS staff

You can use an I Speak Card to help. Carry the card with you and show it to school staff. You can orint a paper card or take a picture with your phone's camera.



When you ask for an interpreter, school staff will connect with one via phone or an app. You will need to wait while staff access language services.

Programs

- If your family speaks other languages at home, your child may qualify for English Learner Services.
 You can ask for a screening up to six months before kindergarten starts. Call the <u>English as a Second Language (ESL)</u> department at 502-485-3623 for help.
- Your child can attend Camp Ready4K. This JCPS summer program helps families and children prepare
 for the transition to kindergarten. Children can learn new skills, engage with other children, and try
 out school routines. Registration opens in early spring. To learn more, call (502) 313-4357 or email
 icps.help@jefferson.kyschools.us.

Health Requirements

The state of Kentucky has <u>health requirements</u> for children starting school. Your child will need physical exams and immunizations. Visit <u>Family Health Centers</u> for providers, services, and information in your preferred language.



Registration Requirements

To sign up for school, you must bring papers to show guardianship and residence. Families may register their children regardless of immigration status.

Type of Document	Accepted Document
Proof of Child's Birth	Birth certificate, passport, or <u>I-94 form</u>
Proof of Family's Address	Lease or recent <u>utility bill</u>
Parent's or Guardian's Identification	<u>Driver's license</u> or consular ID card from U.S. or former country

- If you do not have all documents, JCPS will still register and enroll your student. You will need to
 present your documents as soon as possible.
- If an adult does not have legal custody of children in their care, they can use a power of attorney form
 or caregiver affidavit.
- You may register your children for school even if you do not have a fixed, regular residence. Call the JCPS Office of Access and Opportunity at (502) 485-3650 for help.

Refugee Agencies

- School enrolls and completes a Home Language Survey (HLS) with ALL new students.
- If registering through an agency, it is completed before enrolling.



Home Language Survey

The survey is student specific so families will complete one for each child.





Home Language Survey

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The purpose of the home language survey (HLS) is to determine the primary or home language of the student. This information is essential in order for schools to provide meaningful instruction for all students. The HLS is part of the statewide identification process required under Section 3113(b)(2) of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and 703 KAR 5:070.

The HLS must be given to all students enrolled in the school district.

The HLS is administered one time, upon initial enrollment in grades K-12 and remains in the student's cumulative file.

Please note that the answers to the survey below are student-specific. If a language other than English is recorded for ANY of the required survey questions below, the district is legally obligated to do further assessment of your child to determine if he/she is eligible for language support.

Answers will not be used for determining legal status or for immigration purposes. If your child is identified for English language services, you may decline some or all of the services offered to your child.

- Multilingual families can choose to schedule a screening appointment for their children at the Intake Center prior to starting school but are not required to do so.
- Schools administer the HLS to all families and enter the information into our district system.
- The ESL office can access a report with all students who reported another language at enrollment. This enables the district to reach out to families to schedule screening appointments.





Overview of Process





Initial Assessment

- One-on-one assessment to screen English proficiency in four domains: reading, writing, listening, speaking.
 - For early screening and through December of kindergarten, only listening and speaking domains are screened.
 - O Starting in January of kindergarten, all four domains are screened.
- Length of test: Depends on proficiency level but typically 15–45 minutes.
- Kindergarten students automatically qualify for services but parents have the right to decline services.



Parent Interview

- Parent will sit with a facilitator who speaks their language or facilitator will call an interpreter.
- Confirm contact information and provided documents.
- Confirm home language.
- Ask about entry date to the country. Determines immigrant/refugee status used by the state funding purposes, not to check their legal status.
- Ask about students' country of birth, for immigrant/refugee status.
- Ask about previous academic history of the student, if applicable.
- Services are explained and parent is given the right to decline services based on their preference or student proficiency.





Intake

- Data is updated in the system regarding their English Learner status.
- An application is submitted on their behalf if not already submitted.
- Once a placement is made, the school should reach out to the family to welcome them. If the school has not called within three days of the appointment, the family can call Intake to find out the school placement.
- Receiving school is emailed information about incoming student so they can create a Program Service Plan in collaboration with parent and classroom teacher.



ESL Services





Questions to Ask Schools About Services

- Every school in JCPS has different staffing and service models.
- ESL teachers are obligated to create a Program Service Plan within the first 30 days of school and should include parent/guardian input.



Sample Questions:

- How many days a week will my child receive services?
- In what type of environment will services be provided?
- How can I help my child at home?



General Timeline and Early Screening

- If screened between March and the set deadline in August, services start on Day 1 of kindergarten.
- If screened after the start of school, services begin within three days of screening due to data entry updates and communication to school.
- ESL Intake started a collaboration with Early Childhood this year for site-based screening and information sharing so we can reach out to families.
- If not enrolled in an Early Childhood Program, families can call (502) 485-3623 to set up an appointment.


